

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This article about the PICK project in Oklahoma was featured in the 2024 Transportation in Oklahoma Annual Report. KATS administers this program in several communities.

The Biden-Harris administration has awarded \$360,378 for the PICK 2.0 project in Oklahoma. The funding comes from the Rural Surface Transportation Grant Program, which provides funds for projects in rural areas that aim to improve accessibility, connectivity and safety for residents. The PICK 2.0 project is one of 18 projects selected for the fiscal year of 2023-2024.

The PICK 2.0 project expands on the existing PICK Transportation project that services rural and tribal communities in Oklahoma. This system provides customers with on-demand micro transit services in even the most out-of-the-way communities. Building upon the PICK Transportation pilot program, PICK 2.0 will expand the current service area for wider coverage and more accessibility that will enable new customers to benefit from the project.

"Rural communities face some of the toughest transportation challenges, yet are often left out of major federal investments, a pattern that we are changing that under President Biden's leadership," U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg said in a press release from Dec. 2023. "The grants we're announcing today will make transportation in rural communities better, safer, and more reliable."

PICK Transportation's microtransit availability is an on-demand service that does not require booking ahead of time. This accessibility is crucial to those who live in rural and tribal communities where multimodal transportation is limited, especially during non-peak hours. The fare for PICK Transportation customers is a flat rate of \$3, regardless of the pickup location in Oklahoma.

Receiving the grant award for the PICK 2.0 project is the Grand Gateway Economic Development Association (GGEDA), an organization comprised of local government agencies that collaborate to determine community issues and solutions. The PICK Transportation microtransit service was developed as a pilot program by the GGEDA to provide transit-dependent residents with curb-to-curb rides on demand in rural and tribal communities.

Currently, PICK Transportation is available in the following areas: Bartlesville, Bristow, Catoosa, Claremore, Coweta, Grove, Kiefer, Miami, Ponca City, Poteau, Pryor, Owasso, Sallisaw, Sapulpa, Skiatook, Tahlequah and Vinta. The GGEDA made the service accessible for all potential customers by offering multiple different options for scheduling a ride from any of these locations. Customers can also schedule a PICK Transportation ride from the UBER App at no additional charge. By

providing multiple ways to schedule a ride, the service can reach more potential users due to its ease of use.

PICK 2.0 will expand the current consortium of the program to include an additional four transit agencies: First Capital Trolley, Lift Community Action Agency, Southern Oklahoma Rural Transit Agency and Southwest Community Action Group. This expansion will allow for improved access to the PICK Transportation service and increase connectivity throughout Oklahoma.

The service provided by PICK 2.0 improves mobility for the people who live in the service area and are dependent on public transit systems. PICK 2.0 will be able to offer more people throughout the state a way of getting to where they need to be in a safe and affordable way. PICK Transportation offers direct benefits to those who live in rural and tribal communities that are dependent on transit availability. With expanded services, more people will be able to travel to work, school or enjoy recreational time with loved ones. Having more multimodal options for residents improves the quality of life and equitable opportunities in the historically underserved regions of the state.

When the PICK Transportation pilot program initially launched in June 2021, ridership was 358 in that first month. Since then, ridership has experienced a consistent, gradual increase month after month, surpassing 2,000 trips per month in July and Aug. 2022. As more customers learn about the service and it spreads into new communities throughout Oklahoma, ridership is expected to continue increasing. The PICK Transportation team also uses community events, social media and flyers to spread awareness of the curb-to-curb service they provide. The Rural Surface Transportation Grant Program award will allow the expanded operations to not only serve more customers but also have the means to do so.

The ability to have on-demand transportation through the PICK Transportation project is a way to solve mobility issues in Oklahoma's underserved regions and potentially bridge travel gaps that traditional transit is not able to. By establishing relationships among transportation providers PICK Transportation has managed to deliver affordable, on-demand transportation to tribal nations and other rural communities in the state. The expansion of PICK 2.0 will only further the benefits of the project to more regions, creating a more connected Oklahoma.

Just like in our standard offices, staff will process new applications, complete reviews and changes for active cases, issue EBT cards, receive documents and answer questions.
